

Volunteer Profiles:

Ed and Linda Shimp: HPWHC Volunteers

Ed and Linda Shimp of Spearfish first visited the High Plains Western Heritage Center about three years ago to visit Danny Fabricius, a cousin who had been working at the museum; they wanted to visit him – and take a look through the museum.

"That's when we discussed becoming volunteers. We tried it and we were hooked!"

The Shimps are natives of South Dakota. Ed was born in Belle Fourche. His parents raised cattle and grew sugar beets near Fruitdale. The youngest of three children, he had two older sisters.

Linda Beeman was born in Pierre, the older of two Beeman daughters. When Linda was three, the family moved to Belle Fourche where her father took a job at the bentonite plant.

Ed and Linda went to the same church and were classmates through school years. Ed recalls often visiting the A&W Drive-Inn where Linda worked! They began dating and ended up at the Junior-Senior Prom together. Both were 1969 graduates of Belle Fourche High School.

In 1970, Ed joined the Army National Guard and went to Basic Training at Fort Ord, California, becoming a radio operator. For about six months in 1971, he worked road construction in Wyoming before moving to Denver, taking a job in home construction.

"The National Guard was a good experience," Ed recalled. "Our unit was activated and provided assistance to Rapid City during the 1972 flood."

Linda was enrolled at Black Hills State University from

June 1969 through August 1971 before she, too, went to Denver and worked as a secretary. Ed and Linda returned briefly to Belle Fourche to get married at St. James Lutheran Church on January 29, 1972. Linda recalls "We had a one-night honeymoon at Little America near Cheyenne on our way back to Denver!"

In June 1973, Ed was hired as a cable splicer with Mountain Bell Telephone Company in Denver. Ed and Linda's first child, Brendan, was born the following year. Sisters Leah and Natasha followed in 1976 and 1979.

After nearly a decade in Denver, Ed was transferred by Mountain Bell to Durango as a lineman in 1980. Linda went to work for the Principal at the Elementary School in nearby Ignacio, Colorado in 1984, remaining with the school 13 years.

In 1997, Ed was transferred to Phoenix with the telephone company, which had become "Quest." He worked for two more years – was credited with an additional two years for retirement purposes – giving him a total of 30 years when he

retired from the company in 2001.

Ed and Linda lived in Kingman for 13 years, then decided to return to the



Black Hills and Spearfish in 2016.

The Shimps have six grandchildren: four grandsons and two granddaughters. Son Brendan in Spokane has a boy and a girl; daughter Leah lives in Gilbert, Arizona and has two boys and one girl; and Shimp's younger daughter, Natasha, resides in Phoenix and has one adopted son.

During their Colorado years, the Shimps enjoyed boating and water skiing. Ed also dabbled with ultra-lite aircraft and also earned his pilot's license.

Now, in addition to their volunteering at High Plains Western Heritage Center, Linda has become deeply involved in church activities. Ed and Linda are members of Connection Church in Belle Fourche.
